#### From the BOARD -- CONSERVATION UPDATE

What's going on with ECAS conservation projects? Here is an update on some of the current projects and also a call for volunteers to help.

Stu Garrett is leading two projects relating to Sage Grouse restoration in our area. In one project, he and other volunteers will monitor the presence of West Nile Virus in the Brothers Priority Area for Conservation east of Bend. This is important because West Nile Virus is one of the contributors to the decline of the Greater Sage Grouse. A grant from ECAS was used to purchase four mosquito traps. Four water sources will be visited multiple times during the summer. At each water source, a trap will be left overnight and picked up the next morning. Mosquitoes will be removed and sent to the OSU lab in Corvallis for testing. The results will be reported to BLM and ODFW. If West Nile Virus is present, this may influence the implementation of the BLM's management plan for Sage Grouse restoration in the Brothers PAC. Stu is still looking for people to help set out and pick up the traps. If you are interested in this project, please contact him at: <a href="mailto:garrett@bendcable.com">garrett@bendcable.com</a>.

Stu Garrett is also leading a project to help prevent Sage Grouse collisions with wire fences in the desert east of Bend. This is done by attaching plastic markers, which have reflective tape on each side, to the fences. The next "Marker Party" is scheduled for July 20. If you would like to participate in a low physical impact project then you might consider hanging these markers. You get a bucket full of markers and place four of them between each "T" post. It goes pretty quickly when enough hands are helping out. If you are interested in helping with this project, please contact Stu at: <a href="mailto:garrett@bendcable.com">garrett@bendcable.com</a>.

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Speaking of fence markers, I am in possession of hundreds of the plastic strips, provided by BLM, that need to have reflective tape added to make more markers. These will be cut into three inch markers after the tape has been applied. It is pretty easy to attach the tape to the plastic. In addition, I am still putting caps (metal screens) on vault toilet vents. These caps are to prevent wildlife entry (mainly birds) into these pipes. Fifty of these metal caps were purchased by ECAS last year and about 20 are left, most of which will go on toilets in the Sisters' area. The ECAS Board has already approved the purchase of 25 more caps once this supply runs out. Would you like to help with this project? Contact me at: tjlawler@crestviewcable.com.

Finally, I am also taking the lead on a project to replace the upper blind at Cabin Lake. I am taking the lead on this project. The existing blind will be demolished, and a new blind will be built in the footprint of the demolished blind. The new blind will be built in the style of the lower blind, which was rehabilitated last year. This project is awaiting approval from Deschutes National Forest staff to proceed. I will ask for volunteers once this project is approved. In the meantime, if you visit Cabin Lake, please do take a trash bag to pick up any debris that you may find.

## Dean Hale Woodpecker Festival -- Another Success

First, a big thank-you to all the folks who helped make the 2017 Festival a success: the guides, the guide coordinator (Chuck Gates), the registration coordinator (Sherrie Pierce), the folks that helped with registration at the Park and at the Belfry at the count-down dinner. Many people spent many hours scouting the trip routes for nesting woodpeckers. Our Treasurer, Terri Hyde, kept the money straight and paid the bills. Thank you all!

The Festival was a financial success again this year. We had 103 people sign up for the 212 trips we offered. Almost all trips were filled, and most were filled early in the registration process. A number of states were represented.

The festival T-shirt featured a Pileated Woodpecker by artist Wren Walraven. Sales were brisk, and the remaining shirts will be available for purchase at upcoming Birders' Nights. Festival income totaled about \$7200. Expenses were around \$1800, leaving a profit of \$5400. These funds will be used to support ECAS programs and for grants to other organizations.

## Fledgling Fun Folds Its Wings

After seven years of providing educational programs about birds to children in grades K-5, the Fledgling Fun program and its presenters are retiring. Started in 2011 as the brainchild of the ECAS Education Committee, Mary Yanalcanlin and Desiree Johnson Morris originated and developed the curriculum and activities and have been stalwart presenters every year since. Joined by various volunteers over the years, their expertise and skills have provided the consistency of information presented once a month, eight times a year, to the children attending this after school program.

Fledgling Fun topics have covered the gamut from Birds of Bend, Bird Beaks, Bird Behavior, and Waterfowl to Owls, Winter Birding, and, finally, a Bird-day Celebration in May of what was

learned over the course of the year. Each year brought new topics and activities and many children returned to build on the previous year's information. An average of 20 children per session attended with approximately 150 attending over the year.

Mary's knowledge of child development and education and Desiree's background as a biologist, botanist and teacher, combined with their love of birds, produced the perfect combination for this program's success. They both felt it would be difficult to replicate what they brought

to the program and thus the folding of wings with their

retirement. Desiree recently welcomed her second child plus works full time as a nurse and Mary will continue to be active in birding and lead the weekly Birding for Pre-schoolers as well as run her own daily tutoring business. Thanks to these wonderful volunteers who have brought so much fun to so many children as they learned about birds. Who knows? One of them might be the next Noah Stryker!

# Spring 2017 Field Notes

Even in the "non-birding" world, bird song is recognized as a harbinger of spring. The longer days of spring awaken glands in the birds that produce chemicals which cause the birds to sing. So in a very real sense, spring causes bird song and singing signals the arrival of spring. Cycles within cycles. Add migration, another cyclical event, and spring takes on new looks and sounds. All this singing and movement, caused by a few proteins, caused by the lengthening of the day. Fascinating!

Below is a summary of the bird highlights for the spring of 2017. These highlights occurred between the months of March through May and are limited to Jefferson, Crook and Deschutes counties.

Spring waterfowl and shorebird migration are as iconic as fall pilgrims and cornucopias. That icon status was supported by an abundance of nice water bird sightings this spring. TRUMPETER SWANS were found in the Paulina and O'Neal valleys of Crook County (Gates, Kutzen, Staats). Houston Lake in Powell Butte hosted a EURASIAN WIGEON (Gates) and another was spotted on the Redmond Sewer Ponds (Lowe). A GREATER SCAUP was photographed at the Redmond Sewer Ponds (White) and a late LONG-TAILED DUCK was noted at Wickiup Reservoir on April Fools Day (Low). Not one, but two GREEN HERONS were spotted briefly near the Prineville Sewer Ponds in early May (Holley). SANDHILL CRANE reports came in from Sisters (Low), Ochoco Reservoir (Halvorson) and Summit Prairie (MacDonald).

Houston Lake hosted three SEMIPALMATED PLOVER and a report of eleven BLACK-NECKED STILTS at the Redmond Sewer Ponds was a bit unusual for Deschutes County (Nordstrom). LESSER YELLOWLEGS are more unusual in the spring than fall so birds at Hatfield (Low), Redmond Sewer Ponds (Kathol) and the Prineville Wetlands (Gates) were of note. A late RED-NECKED PHALAROPE turned up at the Redmond Sewer Ponds on May 23 (White) and as many as seventeen LONG-BILLED CURLEW were seen in their annual stop-over spot on Agency Plains north of Madras (Namitz, Corkran). Reports of WILLET from Paulina Valley (Gates) are not all that unusual but one from the Redmond Sewer Ponds (Kathol) was field note worthy. Jim Moodie was able to pick out a single SEMIPALMATED SANDPIPER from a flock of peeps at the Redmond Sewer Ponds on May 16. Finally, a SHORT-BILLED DOWITCHER was photographed at the Prineville Wetlands for a rare Crook County record (Lowe, Gonzalez).

Raptors and Game Birds are intricately entwined as they do the dance of survival. For that reason, we'll combine them for this report. Several CHUKAR were heard calling on Hwy 27 near Bear Creek in Crook County (Gates, Nordstrom). Many locals were able to view the SAGE GROUSE lek in Millican as ECAS and agency personnel work together to keep this event open to the public. A DUSKY GROUSE was heard booming near Lookout Mt. (Archer) and MOUNTAIN QUAIL were located on FR 33 (Archer) and along McKay Creek (Gates) in the Ochocos.

A NORTHERN GOSHAWK was seen at Calliope Crossing on May 20 (Otley). The last ROUGH-LEGGED HAWK of the season was spotted in Powell Butte on April 10 (Gates). Three different RED-SHOULDERED HAWKS were found around Bend (Gonzalez, Crabtree, Moodie). FLAMMULATED OWLS were heard calling in the Ochocos (Gates, Hood), the Cascades (Gates,Gonzalez) and even near Bend (Meredith). Other owl sightings included LONG-EARED near Gray Butte (Gates, Nordstrom), GREAT GRAY in Sunriver (Lawler), BURROWING in Paulina (Gates) and NORTHERN SAW-WHET west of Sisters (Gates). Also, WESTERN SCREECH-OWLS were discovered at Deschutes River Woods (Moodie) and near LaPine (Arneson).

A BAND-TAILED PIGEON visited an Eagle Crest feeder for several days (Golden) and the Redmond WHITE-WINGED DOVE found earlier in the year was last reported on March 1 (Crabtree).

Small perching birds often make up the bulk of rare bird reports in the spring. Three BLACK SWIFTS were seen briefly at Peter Skein Ogden Wayside on May 31 (Linz, McLean). BLACK-CHINNED HUMMINGBIRDS are fairly common in Crook and parts of Jefferson but the Deschutes birds reported from Sisters (White), Aspen Lakes (Tachmeier) Deschutes River Woods (Moodie) and East Bend (Souhrada) were certainly unusual. WESTERN KINGBIRDS rarely make this summary due to their abundance but a bird showing up a month early on March 3 was worthy of inclusion (Rems). BLUE-GRAY GNATCATHERS were found on Hwy 380 in Crook (Beerman), near Pine Ridge in Jefferson (Gates, Nordstrom) and on Wilt Road near Sisters (Low). A lone VEERY was heard singing west of Camp Sherman along Lake Creek in late May (Sullivan). It was a good winter for BOHEMIAN WAXWINGS and that trend continued into the spring season with birds being seen at Camp Polk (Lordi, Kancler), Alfalfa (Low), Tetherow Crossing (Ogle) and the Dry River area of the Badlands (Ryan).

An unusual Deschutes LARK SPARROW was heard singing near the Tetherow neighborhood west of Redmond (Kathol) and a rare CLAY-COLORED SPARROW was singing on Spencer Wells Road near Bend in May (Schlick). The first FOX SPARROW of the season was spotted in mid-March (Lordi, Kancler) and famous "Jake's" HARRIS'S SPARROW stuck around at the Sisters feeder until March 27 (White). WHITE-THROATED SPARROW reports came in from Hatfield Lake (Miller), Black Butte Swamp (Hinkles, Scatteregia), Camp Polk Meadow (Schas)

and Sawyer Park (Low). TRICOLORED BLACKBIRDS were seen around Prineville (Gates) as is normal for that species. A very unusual BOBOLINK report was received as a bird flew over Hwy 97 north of Terrebonne (Hoffman). The final bird highlight was a flock of GRAY-CROWNED ROSY-FINCHES seen at Smith Rock in mid-March (Lowe).

As I finish this report, I'm reminded of the many cyclic events that affect my life. Even this report is cyclic as I type a new one every year. Cycles within cycles. Fascinating!

# What's Happening

#### September 22 Three Birding Adventures in Ecuador

Gary and Lynn Clark trace their start with serious international birding to their first trip to Ecuador in 2008, when they explored the northwest region of the country. Two subsequent tours have encompassed the Napo River region of the Amazon Basin on the east side, and the Central Andean Cordillera from north to south. This presentation will attempt to give the viewer a feeling for the country, the experience of birding there, and the flora and fauna of these quite different regions. Of course, the emphasis will be on the birds, as photographed by Gary. Gary's bird photos appear in Wikipedia, on the National Audubon web field guide and calendar, and have won awards in the "top 100" annual contest. He and Lynn live in the high desert east of Bend, where they spend their days hoping for yet another new yard species to appear.

#### October 19 Birding Brazil

Marilynne and John Keyser have been traveling the world in search of birds since their retirement and move to Oregon in 2001. They have been to many countries, often with Fieldguides, Inc. out of Austin, Texas, and occasionally on private trips with friends or on their own. They have made several trips to Brazil, birding the Pantanal, the central plateau, and the Atlantic forests of the southeast. Their presentation will feature not only the spectacular birds, but also the habitats and the large mammals of Brazil's temperate part of the country.
