#### An update on the vote for a name change for ECAS

Several months have passed since this topic was discussed at the Annual Meeting so the Board would like to update ECAS members on the plan to consider a name change. We are still resolved to ask for a membership vote on whether ECAS should be renamed. We have waited to proceed with this plan until the Portland Audubon Society announced their new name to consider whether there was merit in aligning our name with theirs. As many of you will be aware the new name of that group is Bird Alliance of Oregon. Other Oregon chapters have since announced that they will also incorporate "Bird Alliance" in their new name. We think that it is a good idea to align ECAS with the much larger Portland group as well as other Oregon chapters and will make a proposal for a vote on whether East Cascades Audubon Society should be renamed East Cascades Bird Alliance. There are costs associated with changing our name. We have been offered a \$5,000 donation from an anonymous source to cover our

expenses and reduce impact on ECAS's mission and current projects. The only requirement to receive this donation is that we include "Bird Alliance" in the new name.

As mentioned at the Annual Meeting, we will first hold a vote on a proposal to change the threshold for approval of any future change to the ECAS Constitution from a two thirds majority to 50% +1 of those participating in the vote. We intend to initiate this vote in early March with an announcement when the vote is closed.

In accordance with the ECAS Constitution, both of these votes are designated as Special Meetings of the membership. The Board considers this the best way to maximize member participation in these important issues.

Voting will be online using a third-party voting website called Election Buddy. You will receive an email from this group that contains a link to the actual vote which will be a simple Yes/No choice. Voting is anonymous and you will receive confirmation that your vote has been recorded. No one can find out who voted Yes or No.

Our birding community lost a stalwart with the death of Glenn Cantor in a tragic accident on February 16,2024. He was active in the Wednesday Birding group as well as participating in other events such as the Christmas Bird Counts and Greenridge Hawk Watch.
